


UPPER FLOOR

MUSEUM ACCESSIBILITY

The Museum is arranged on three floors and has many steps and stairs.

Areas 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 are on the ground floor and include a slight ramp; areas 6 and 7 are up a flight of stairs. Area 8 is up a few steps; area 9 is down a flight of stairs.

A stairlift is available to access areas 6 and 7 - the Museum Custodian will assist in it's use. The ground floor toilet has wheelchair access, and area 9 can be accessed by arrangement with the Custodian on duty.

Dogs, other than guide/service dogs, are not permitted in the Museum.

Museum at a glance



Social and Maritime History

Explore the story of the Sea Haven and Merchant Town of Stromness, the Lighthouses of Orkney and the pirate John Gow. There is also a collection of photo archives.

2 Temporary Exhibition

Changing exhibitions that feature a variety of themes relevant to Orkney. This area also features shipwrecks and the tale of Jack Renton who survived eight years captive on the Solomon Islands before returning home to Stromness.

3 Wartime and Scapa Flow

Orkney played a major role as a naval base in two World Wars; this collection relates to our place in the wartime history of Great Britain. Floor cases in this area contain bird eggs plus butterfly and moth specimens.

4 Hudson Bay and Dr John Rae

On display are many items relating to the Hudson Bay Company and life in North Canada which includes local family collections and trade goods. Learn the story of Artic explorer, Dr John Rae discoverer of the North-West passage.

Africa and Dr William Balfour Baikie

A collection of objects from Baikie's travels, an Orcadian Explorer and pioneer of the Niger.

6 Natural History

A rare example from the Victorian period; a magnificent display of birds sits collectively with native mammals and specimens of Orkney sea life.

A prize exhibit in the fossil collection is 'Homosteus milleri' which contributed to Darwin's theory of evolution.

7 Ethnography

The museum founders' interest in Orkney antiquities grew over the years to encompass a variety of unusual artefacts brought home by Orcadians from around the world.

8 Seafaring

Ship Dioramas: See large ships built in miniature with these detailed scale models.

Sail Traders: Nautical tools, memorabilia and photo archives document the town's thriving shipping import and export past.

Ship Paintings: A beautiful collection of oil and watercolours.

9 Whaling and Moravian Mission

For over a century Artic whalers called into Stromness for fresh provisions and crewmen the display includes harpoons, traverse boards and exquisite scrimshaw work.

The Moravian missionaries traded goods with the Inuit to support their work, mission ships were regular visitors to Stromness with many Orcadians serving as crew. On show is a selection of items relating to this time.
